PEACE IN EUROPE: HOW CAN WE HELP?

These thoughts marked the start of our response, as an orchestra, to the events in Ukraine. What followed -

the invasion - was the launch on 25 March in Ferrara Italy of our PEACE IN EUROPE 2022 project with a series of concerts in seven countries across Europe from the Baltic to the Mediterranean and

the North Sea to south-eastern Poland near the Ukrainian border, all dedicated to the cause of peace in Europe and to highlighting the plight of victims of violence.

Our subsequent assistance is focused on a new partnership with the Youth Symphony Orchestra of Ukraine (YsOU), helping raise funds for their musicians to find a temporary haven in Ljubljana, opening projects such as the EUYO's new EUYO Frontrunners online programme to YsOU members, inviting YsOU musicians into some of our projects, assisting the YsOU management, and offering side by side performance possibilities between YsOU and the EUYO into the future. Anyone wishing to help can do so by making a donation via our Peace in Europe page on our website.

These may all seem like small contributions – and in the grand scheme of things they are – but many small actions can build a mountain of help. And that is probably the best way, just now, that we can all help.

HARMONY IN DIVERSITY

This year, Putin's bombs targeted theatres and concert halls across Ukraine – from Kharkiv's Opera and Philharmonic to Mariupol's Theatre. In Kherson, Russian soldiers shot dead conductor Yuriy Kerpatenko because he refused to play for the occupiers. These attacks did not only target unarmed civilians, but also the symbols of Ukraine's cultural identity. The European Union Youth Orchestra responded to Putin's war in the best possible way. The Orchestra took a stand for Ukraine and for peace. They chose music by Ukrainian composer Valentyn Silvestrov for their final encore. And they offered a partnership to the Youth Symphony Orchestra of Ukraine, bringing Ukraine and the EU one step closer to each other.

This is the power of music. Music can tell the story of a country, of its struggle for freedom and for independence. At the same time, music can be the universal language that brings people together, across borders and boundaries. The European Union Youth Orchestra was born with this mission. It brings together the best and brightest young musicians from across Europe. They come from different backgrounds, speak different languages, and of course play different instruments. But they are united by the same passion for music and for Europe. Two years ago, I had the pleasure to listen to the EUYO play in Switzerland, and it made me think: this is what our Union's motto – "unity in diversity" – sounds like. This is harmony in diversity.

The EUYO is a great ambassador for Europe. The Orchestra embodies European values – both the founding values of our

Union, such as peace and diversity, and the values of the new generations of Europeans. I am thinking, for instance, about the respect for nature and for our climate. In 2022 the EUYO used its music to raise awareness about the urgency of climate action. For instance, they have joined a project called *The (Uncertain) Four Seasons*: a revisited version of Vivaldi's masterpiece, in which storms have grown fiercer and

songbirds have fallen silent because of the dramatic reality of climate change. It is art at the service of the noblest and most urgent cause of our times.

I am also especially grateful to the EUYO for creating the new Café Bauhaus Awards. The New European Bauhaus is the cultural dimension of the European Green Deal, that is, our plan to reconcile our economy with the planet. The economy of the future must aim for zero emissions and circularity. But this is not enough. We must also rediscover that humans need beauty to thrive. We need nature in our lives, and we need art to be available and affordable for everyone. This is the spirit of the Café Bauhaus Awards. For instance, one of the first winners is a project focusing on sustainable tourism in the Balearic Islands: it brings music to all corners of the archipelago, while respecting nature and local communities. This kind of creativity is essential to bring about the green transformation that the world needs.

The great Claudio Abbado, who founded the Orchestra, used to say: "It does not matter whether musicians speak different languages. What matters is that they listen to each other." In an orchestra, the best musician is not the one who plays louder and faster than others, but the one who listens most carefully. Our Union should be like an orchestra. We should all listen to each other, and especially to young generations. We made 2022 the European Year of the Youth precisely for this reason: it was a moment for Europe to listen to its young generation. And this should continue well beyond 2022. I want Europe to listen and to be like its young people. Every action that our Union takes should be inspired by a simple principle: we should leave the world a better place for the next generation. The European Union Youth Orchestra contributes to this goal. It brings opportunity to hundreds of young musicians. And it brings our European values to life.

NEXUS WORLD PREMIERE

For its 70th anniversary in 2020, the European Broadcasting Union commissioned a new orchestral piece to highlight the importance of public service media's role in nurturing and promoting fresh European talent. Nexus, by British composer Hannah Kendall, was commissioned for the European Union Youth Orchestra and commemorates the 250th anniversary of Beethoven's birth. Postponed due to the pandemic, the piece's world premiere – under the baton of Gianandrea Noseda – took place on 16 August 2022 at Bolzano Festival Bozen and was broadcast live by RAI Radio 3. Before Nexus rehearsals began, we interviewed Hannah Kendall about the composition and how it was conceived.

Nexus commemorates the 250th anniversary of Beethoven's birth. In the composition, you mirror his 5th Symphony with important political events occurring in the same era. How is this portrayed in the music? And what does the title Nexus mean?

In the piece that I wrote for the European Union Youth Orchestra, I aim to mirror some aspects of the 5th Symphony through some of the gestures, tonalities, and keys that Beethoven himself incorporates into his own piece. Also, I draw on aspects of Afro-diasporic folk songs, transcribing them into music boxes. This is because I was particularly drawn to the fact that in 1808 when Beethoven's 5th Symphony was written, it was also the same year that the

the British Act of Parliament prohibiting the importation of slaves to the United States took effect. I was really interested in looking back on that time and looking at those connections within history, which is why the piece is called Nexus. The word means "a complicated series of connections between different things". And rather than focusing just on Europe, or just on what was happening in the Americas, I wanted to aim to kind of bring those historical themes into an interweaving connection. Primarily, that's because of my own heritage which is African Caribbean, but also very much European. I wanted to try and at least aim to bring together these lots of different aspects in the piece.

The piece was written for the European Union Youth Orchestra, which unites the idea of nurturing young talent for future generations with a shared sense of European heritage. How did those elements influence your work in Nexus?

I am particularly interested in this idea of a shared sense of heritage, and in this case, the shared sense of European heritage, because that is certainly something that I have enjoyed as a musician, as an artist, the sharing of ideas, of practice, which is only a positive thing and has wholly shaped the development of my own compositional approach and style. I suppose these aspects very much influenced the centre of the work Nexus, choosing to incorporate traditional European songs, specifically those by Beethoven, and interweaving them with traditional songs from elsewhere, that might be considered as being non-European Afro diasporic. But what's fascinating about these folk songs that were first sung, and first composed, on the plantations in the Americas, is that they were very much influenced by the European presence, for obvious reasons. So, it's this kind of cyclical pattern that I'm interested in exploring more and have tried to bring into the work.

This work has been commissioned to highlight the importance of public service media's role in promoting young European talent. To you and for the dissemination of your work, what does public service media represent? For me, public service media is vital. It is absolutely about the dissemination of thoughts, ideas, music, art, all sorts of things. But it's fundamentally about connecting a wide, broad, diverse range of people together. •

IN MEMORY OF DAVID SASSOLI

David Sassoli, the much respected President of the European Parliament and EUYO Honorary President, passed away on 11 January 2022. Below, EUYO Advisory Council Member Hon. Silvia Costa reprises her words in his honour on the occasion of the concert in his memory on 25 March 2022. The concert was attended by his family, and fittingly, was also the opening concert of the EUYO's Peace In Europe project.

I am very touched and honoured to remember David Sassoli, a close friend and great President of the European Parliament. I would like to dedicate a particularly affectionate and moving salute to our dear Alessandra Vittorini Sassoli, David's beloved wife, who is here with us.

No one could have imagined that after two years of a tragic pandemic we would have witnessed an inexcusable and atrocious war on the borders of Europe unleashed by the Russian Federation against Ukraine. Nor could we have imagined that we would be confronted with the great void left by David Sassoli. Despite his illness, he died just as he concluded his mandate, with great courage and political passion. David deeply loved music and was himself a musician. He loved young people and Europe. For these reasons,

he enthusiastically lived his designation as Honorary President of the EUYO.

David was a true friend to me, a younger brother with whom I shared many

seasons of my life and ten years in the European Parliament. He was a man of solid values and polite manners, a journalist of talent who chose direct involvement in politics and, above all, a convinced pro-European. The great pain and the enormous, spontaneous participation that

his disappearance caused are astonishing and moving. They revealed to us how much David entered people's hearts, with his remarkable talent, recognized above all by the youngest: that of transmitting his unshakable trust in the European project, which – he always remembered – is a project of Freedom, Democracy, Justice, Peace, born precisely to say never again to war, to nazi-fascism, to the violation of the dignity of the human person.

David Sassoli has always been at our side in enhancing and investing in European culture and cultural heritage, which he considered essential for forming a proper European awareness. In the beauty of the European cultural heritage, the richness of linguistic and cultural diversity, and the shared values, he identified the heart of European civilization; not superior – he said – but diverse, which makes it unique in the world.

The young EUYO musicians are ambassadors of this extraordinary European spiritual and cultural heritage. Like David, they know how the power of music unites people. This is why I ask you to commit yourselves, in these crucial times, to defend the reasons for our freedom, for the autonomy of culture and the arts so that the bridges of cultural dialogue are not undermined.

GRAFENEGG ACADEMY

The classical music world is in upheaval, and the career profile of musicians has been changed forever. An artistic spirit of innovation and a strong interaction with the public are just two of the new requirements faced by musicians. Since 2018 the Grafenegg Academy seeks to guide young professional musicians through this paradigm shift with a wide range of courses given in a stimulating environment. As a central part of Campus Grafenegg, the Grafenegg Academy offers an innovative further education programme catered to instrumentalists in particular. Underpinning all activities is the Grafenegg Academy Orchestra, newly formed each year with international musicians.

The Grafenegg Academy is led by Artistic Curators, such as Håkan Hardenberger, Colin Currie and Alina Ibragimova joined by a group of outstanding fellow artists and tutors. The focus of the collaborative work is the interplay between the individual and the collective through the artistic process. The aim is to create an awareness of a new approach to music making, in which the responsibility for interpretation is placed in the hands of each individual orchestra member. In the pursuit of greater selfawareness and sense of personal responsibility, the orchestra sometimes performs without a conductor.

Campus Grafenegg's very identity has been founded on the active exchange of artistic ideas and experiences, and an intensive examination of the most diverse musical currents. Free from the constraints of typical professional concert life, the musicians in Grafenegg have the opportunity to explore new approaches to their profession.

The Grafenegg Academy culminates in three days of concerts, in which the musicians present audiences with the results of their work together, in a variety of instrumental formations.

OVERCOMING DIFFERENCES THROUGH MUSIC

Bolzano in summer is distinguished by the combination of music and youth. The Bolzano Festival Bozen makes the South Tyrolean capital a point of reference for lovers of classical music. The young musicians who come to Bolzano every summer find energy and stimulation to enrich their professional careers in the dream of the youth orchestras. Around the leitmotif of the orchestras revolves a rich musical programme that comes to life in the city's most iconic venues, including castles, churches and historic buildings. When the young orchestras come to the city, we also try to bring them into contact with unusual places: we can say that with EUYO we have experimented over the years with different formulas to 'contaminate' the city with music... just remember Spazio Klassik, a series of performances for new audiences in small groups in specially designed mobile yurts, or those informal performances that include the orchestra's Close Up outdoor concerts and the performances in the Music Gallery of the Hotel Park Laurin. In this way, we have built that link between youth, music and the city audience that has become a must-attend event for many.

This year the world scene was torn apart by the drama of the war between Russia and Ukraine. What contribution has music made and can it make in this scenario?

Music is an instrument of dialogue by definition, capable of overcoming

all cultural and linguistic barriers.
The EUYO is the embodiment of this statement: a symbol of the aspiration to unite peoples through music, the EUYO is capable of conveying every year

instrumentalisation and protected every artist, whatever their nationality. I was certainly deeply moved by the orchestra's encore, in the concert conducted by Noseda, when they closed the evening with a short, symbolic piece, a nocturnal

serenade by a Ukrainian composer.

It is now an established tradition to hold summer symphony concerts. Although Covid-19 has generally put a bit of a damper on the cultural audience, the Bolzano audience can count on a loyal core of listeners, who this year were very proud to be able to attend the concert of pianist Jae Hong Park, the latest addition to the Ferruccio Busoni Piano Competition winning family, in a performance of Rachmaninov's Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini. The grit of a new generation of orchestral players could be compared to that of this young Korean pianist, whom Bolzano has acclaimed and, with the Busoni Prize, is helping to grow on the international music scene. In its quest for musical excellence and cultural understanding, the EUYO has formed an outstanding bridge between music schools and the professional music world. The enthusiasm of these young musicians, directed and accompanied by outstanding soloists, never betrays the expectations of the audience and indeed gives energy and optimism to face the cultural challenges of the future.



















SPRING TOUR 2022

PEACE IN EUROPE STANDING BY UKRAINE

Our Spring 2022 Tour began with a concert in Ferrara on 25 March that was in different ways all about peace.

Firstly, it was the launch concert for our *Peace in Europe* series. As a cultural ambassador for the EU, the Orchestra plays a key role in exemplifying the EU's highest values and principles, showing that the best hope for harmony in Europe is through combining youth, culture and cooperation. NEW FORMATS NEW AUDIENCES

The EUYO is always seeking out ways to attract new and particularly young audiences.

As part of the Spring 2022 tour, we presented another of our *Music Minus the Rules!* concerts in Ferrara, presenting orchestral music in a completely informal setting, aided by a presenter who was both a talking programme note and an encouragement to the audience to participate in the performance and ask their own questions.

But the major new audience initiative in Spring was the piloting of a radical new format based on an immersive residency in one place. Young Europe Comes to Finland! saw us resident in Helsinki and Tampere, Finland for four days. On pages 14-17 you can read about the extraordinary range of events that we managed to mount during those four days.

By combining our residencies in Ferrara and Finland with a bridge concert in Udine, Italy, we managed a project of more than three weeks in only four cities: a huge advantage in helping reduce our carbon footprint, and definitely a model for the future.

YOUNG EUROPE COMES TO FINLAND!

A NEW TYPE OF RESIDENCY

Four days of activity in two Finnish cities with almost 70 different compositions including lots of Finnish music, an innovative session on the future of culture in Europe as part of the European Year of Youth 2022 with more than 100 young artists, social meet ups with young EU and Finnish musicians, side by side performances placing diverse young Finnish musicians next to musicians from all 27 EU member states, concerts across Helsinki in 11 different venues, and a late night club event. All this and more was made possible by the Creative Europe programme of the European Union, the Jane and Aatos Erkko Foundation, and the Ministry of Education and Culture of Finland.

ALPHA MISSION AELOS

ALPHA MISSION ΔELOS

ALPHA MISSION ΔELOS is an initiative of the World Human Forum that aims to raise awareness globally about the climate crisis and the urgent need for the regeneration of our planet. In the words of the project, "Today, more than ever before in the history of mankind we are in urgent need of redefining humanity's narrative. We, humans have to stand together to deal more kindly with one another, and to preserve and cherish the pale blue dot, the only home we've ever known."

The ALPHA MISSION ΔELOS project was conceived to coincide with the NASA Artemis Mission that will take the first women to the Moon by 2025. It consisted of a recorded concert and film on the sacred island of Delos where, according to the myth, the twin gods Apollo and Artemis were born, and where light was born.

For many centuries in antiquity, Delos was the cosmopolitan centre of the Mediterranean. Today the whole island is an open museum and the ancient ruins on it are already affected by the climate crisis and rising sea level.

THE DELOS CONCERT

The ALPHA MISSION ΔELOS concert on 30 May 2022 formed part of the EUYO's Europe Day celebrations and *Peace in Europe* project, and marked the first time in history that a classical orchestra has performed on the island of Delos.


The concert featured the EUYO String Ensemble, directed by ECHO Rising Star Ukrainian violinist Diana Tishchenko, Greek virtuoso lyra player Sokratis Sinopoulos, and musicians from 17 countries including guests from Ukraine and Russia. The programme consisted of Vivaldi's *The Four Seasons*, with improvised episodes for Lyra, Carmen Fizzarotti's *Floating Autumn* from "The [Uncertain] Four Seasons" and Marshall Marcus' Seventeen Strokes of the Bell for Peace and Sustainability.

The concert was a co-production of the World Human Forum & ARTE in partnership with ZDF, Europa Nostra, the Hellenic Space Center, the National Research Center for Natural Sciences "Demokritos", the Hellenic Foundation for Culture, the Megaron Athens Concert Hall and the Ephorate of Antiquities of the Cyclades, with EUYO as Artistic Partner.

THE DELOS

The concert was live-streamed and broadcast by ARTE, the European cultural channel, on its 30th anniversary. It was broadcast on big screens in the garden of the Megaron Concert Hall in Athens, the Town Hall of Mikonos and the Ekatontapiliani Church of Paros in Greece; the Campo San Lorenzo in Venice, Italy; the Orangerie de la Fondation Hardt in Geneva, Switzerland; and at the Falling Walls conference in Berlin. There are plans for further showings in other major cities.

The film subsequently won the award for the best-televised concert at the 59th Golden Prague International Festival, the international event that presents the best music and dance televised programs in the world. It was featured at Europa Nostra's Brussels Fostering Peace, Solidarity, Beauty & Sustainability New European Bauhaus event and the Prague European Cultural Heritage Summit Agora (see pages 26 & 27), and was later screened in the European Parliament in Brussels, with a key note introduction by European Parliament President and EUYO Honorary President Roberta Metsola.

SUMMER TOUR 2022

EUYO ACROSS EUROPE

As part of the Summer Tour 2022, players from all 27 EU Member States worked and lived together for an intense period of 40 days. During this time, they were coached by expert instrumental professors, and performed with renowned conductors and soloists in 15 public performances in Austria, Germany, Italy, Netherlands and Poland, almost half of these being free informal events.

The programmes included the world première of *Nexus* by Hannah Kendall, commissioned by the European Broadcasting Union (see editorial on page 6). Residencies in Grafenegg, now the home of the Orchestra, and Bolzano, which has hosted the Orchestra during its summer tours since 1980, helped prepare the Orchestra for its Summer 2022 performances.

A FOCUS ON POLAND

The EUYO performed Polish repertoire in two important Polish cultural spaces during the Summer Tour 2022, including a welcome return to Warsaw for a recorded concert as part of the legendary 18th Chopin and his Europe Festival at the beautiful Warsaw Philharmonic Hall. This was preceded by the Orchestra's debut at The Krzysztof Penderecki European Centre for Music, Lusławice as part of the Emanacje Festival.

The EUYO concerts in Poland took place during an important cultural anniversary, the *Year of Polish Romanticism*, which marked the 200th anniversary of the publication of Adam Mickiewicz's *Ballads and Romances*. To celebrate this anniversary, the Adam Mickiewicz Institute carried out projects around the world, showcasing contemporary interpretations of Polish Romanticism.

As part of the celebrations, the EUYO performed *The Sorrowful Tale* by Mieczysław Karłowicz, perhaps the last Polish romantic composer, in both Lusławice and Warsaw.

SERVING THE COMMUNITY

The Orchestra made sure to find time during the 2022 Summer Tour for informal community performances designed for diverse audiences. In Grafenegg there were the ever-popular Late-Night Sessions and a Prelude concert; in Bolzano the Park-Laurin Hotel was opened for a packed free programme of music, and in Amsterdam, the EUYO finished its Summer Tour with free informal performances in a variety of museums and galleries across the city.

All of this work gives the Orchestra the opportunity to programme a huge variety of music. The list of compositions that follow on pages 21–24 features music by female composers, minority ethnic and living composers, and genres that range from classical to world to jazz to contemporary, many of them suggested by EUYO players.

Take the example of the Amsterdam concerts, with the sorrowful sounds of David Bruce's *Gumboots*, and its references to the brutal labour conditions of black miners chained together in South Africa's flooded gold mines, or Sir Harrison Birtwistle's haunting and virtuosic theatre piece *Cortege*. A perfect opportunity for audiences to go from one museum to the other, enriching themselves with a musical variety that was − and perhaps more regularly in concerts should be − on offer. ▶



THE GRAFENEGG RESIDENCY

THE REHEARSALS

The annual Grafenegg residency is always special: immersed in the fairytale scenario of Castle Grafenegg, the EUYO musicians have the opportunity to work with a selection of the best musical tutors in the world and prepare themselves under the guidance of Rehearsal Director Peter Stark.

THE LATE NIGHT SESSIONS

The Late Night Sessions are some of the most energetic and captivating EUYO concert experiences. The EUYO's musicians take control to create a unique and exciting informal show, with genres ranging from classical to folk, from jazz to world and back. With guests, conversation and a wide range of music, this is ideal for young audiences and the young at heart.

MUSICLABS

The EUYO set up two Musiclabs during the Grafenegg 2022 residency: the first one was the welcome return of Dinka Migić-Vlatković, EUYO's mental health coach in residence, to help with alleviating stress and stage fright. The second one saw the entire EUYO Management Team explore the importance of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals for tomorrow's professional musicians in Europe.

WELL-BEING

As well-being grows in importance, the EUYO decided to take care of the physical and mental health of its musicians with a trio of dedicated health and wellbeing experts: Dr Lalith Wijedoru, Health and Wellbeing Officer, Alexander Evans, in charge of Pilates, Seated Chair and Flat Table Massages, and Lucie-Mae Sumner for Yoga and Meditation.



EUROPEAN CULTURAL HERITAGE SUMMIT 2022

THE EUROPEAN HERITAGE POLICY AGORA 2022

The European Cultural Heritage Summit 2022, organised by Europa Nostra in cooperation with the European Commission and the Czech Ministry of Culture, during the Czech Presidency of the Council of the European Union, took place in Prague from 25 to 27 September.

The Summit included the annual Cultural Heritage Awards ceremony, cultural heritage sessions, and as the closing event, the European Heritage Policy Agora "For a Value and Culture-Driven Europe", which took place at the extraordinary Žofín Palace.

This inspiring full-day event addressed some of the most pressing challenges facing the heritage ecosystem in Europe, such as the need to mobilise forces and voices in solidarity with Ukraine's endangered cultural heritage, the role of cultural heritage in fostering peace and solidarity within our societies, and the values of beauty and sustainability for an inclusive green transformation.

EUYO HERITAGE SUMMIT FILM PRESENTATIONS

The EUYO took part in the European Heritage Policy Agora with a video presentation of EUYO alumna Anna Kuk's powerful Trobairitz 'Histoires Naturelles', a series of concerts across Paris with no carbon footprint, and with programmes combining music, poetry, videos, and audience participation, which won an EUYO Café Bauhaus award. (See page 35 for further details).

EUYO Secretary General Marshall Marcus closed the final session with a key note address 'For a Value and Culture-Driven Europe' in which he presented the EUYO Peace in Europe and ALPHA MISSION ΔELOS projects, highlighting that "staring at our challenges in Europe, [no solution] seems possible unless we become real bridge builders with culture, and particularly bridge builders with value driven culture". The address finished with the sending in real time of a message from the Heritage Summit to a session of MONDIACULT 2022 in Mexico City asking MONDIAULT to propose a culture goal for the UN's post-2030 Sustainability Agenda. ▶

CHAMBER MUSIC CONCERTS

ITALY SOUNDS CLASSIC

Italy Sounds Classic presented a three-day event of concerts, conferences, workshops and meetings aimed at young musicians and professionals in the world of classical music, and took place from Thursday 9 to Saturday 11 June at the Volvo Congress Center in Bologna, Italy. The first event of its kind, it is meant to bridge the gap between music school and the professional world of music, favouring meetings, encounters and exchange of opinions.

EUROPA FORUM WACHAU

On the occasion of the 26th Europa-Forum Wachau 2022, four EUYO members and alumni performed for guests from politics, business, culture, media and diplomacy, all meeting to discuss current developments in the European Union. Under the 2022 theme topic *Safeguarding Europe's Future*, the Forum was focused on listening to the opinion of young EU Citizens on central European issues, offering the perfect stage for two EUYO Ambassador performances.

CELEBRATING LOWER AUSTRIA

A concert to celebrate 100 years of Lower Austria Statehood was performed in Brussels, in the beautiful Bibliothèque Solvay on 26 October. The concert took place on the occasion of Austria's National Day, with music by three Austrian composers: Mozart, and two composers from Lower Austria, Joseph Haydn and the little-known Otto Bach. The performance of the Bach string quartet movement may well have been its first performance of modern times, and was possible thanks to the help of the Musiksammlung der Österreichische Nationalbibliothek.

STAUFFER ACADEMY CREMONA

THE STAUFFER LEADER WORKSHOPS

The EUYO 2022 Stauffer Academy chamber residency in Cremona focused on the question of leadership. Four days of intense work focused on the skills required to become a successful leader, and in particular a successful orchestral leader, a role calling for a remarkable variety of skills.

Four EUYO potential leaders were chosen through open auditions to attend the Academy alongside 10 young musicians enrolled in the Stauffer Academy's year-long leadership course.

The project's workshops, lessons and discussions were led by the Concertmaster of the Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia, Andrea Obiso, with further sessions led by EUYO Rehearsal Director Peter Stark, EUYO Secretary General Marshall Marcus, and EUYO audition tutor Oliver Kipp. There were also contributions from EUYO Advisory Council member and Stauffer Academy Director Paolo Petrocelli, 'cellist Steven Isserlis and Europe 101 Leadership Programme Director Julia Middleton.

The workshops were also used as part of the EUYO's final audition for the next EUYO Orchestra Leader. ►

MUSIC HUB AUSTRIA

A NEW EUYO HOME

On 5 December 2022, the EUYO announced a new home in Austria. The move builds upon the Orchestra's 5 years in Ferrara, Italy, a crucial period for the organisation as it transitioned away from its long-term UK base. The EUYO will maintain its highly valuable creative links in Italy, including its annual residency at the Bolzano Festival Bozen, which remains a key part of the Orchestra's summer schedule, as well as its position as ensemble in residence at the Stauffer Academy in Cremona, and the partnership with the Italian national broadcaster RAI.


With a new office in Grafenegg and a base also in Vienna, and further support from the government of Lower Austria and the Federal Republic of Austria, the EUYO is poised to further develop its 13-year relationship with Grafenegg. The move allows the Orchestra to continue its current work in Grafenegg, not only rehearsing and performing there, but also acting as a joint laboratory for the development of new ways of performing, and reaching new audiences, with the musical and administrative functions of the organisation now united in one place for a substantial portion of the year.

MUSIC HUB AUSTRIA

A key development in the EUYO's new work in Grafenegg, Lower Austria and the Federal Republic of Austria is the new *Music Hub Austria* project.

Music Hub Austria develops the work the EUYO has already begun with the Lower Austria Music Schools in a series of joint projects including a shared online learning programme, shared teaching practices, and a new EU young musicians video portrait project helping young Lower Austrian musicians learn about music making and music careers in other EU Member States. Important "side by side" opportunities are also planned which will see the EUYO's talented young players working directly alongside musicians from Lower Austria's enviable young musicians' programme.

It is planned to develop this work throughout Austria in the coming years with new Austrian partners, providing a model for how young people from different cultures working together at a high level of excellence can be the key to a peaceful and successful future in Europe.

EUYO *FRONTRUNNERS*

EUYO's online teaching programme launched in February 2022 to help create tomorrow's musical leaders in Europe by helping EUYO members, recent alumni and selected partners take a holistic approach to their work, thereby creating rewarding and sustainable careers.

WHY A NEW ONLINE LEARNING PROGRAMME?

The quick answer is 'need'. Once it was enough to have a good teacher, practice hard and perform a good audition. Now there are new pressures on young musicians – navigating the online world, issues around diversity, equity and inclusion, sustainability and climate change, and all the problems arising from Covid and the Ukraine invasion.

To help with these challenges, the EUYO has created Frontrunners as a programme of sustainable orchestral musicianship, drawing inspiration from the UN's 2030 Sustainability Development Goals and the EU's 2021–27 Creative Europe Agenda, as well as the Orchestra's own priorities and goals.

HOW DOES THE PROGRAMME WORK?

A new faculty of specialist teachers under the guidance of global teaching expert and EUYO Frontrunners Advisor Eric Booth present sessions throughout the year across four areas: Perform, Include, Share and Sustain.

PERFORM is about stage and performing skills in the broadest sense, such as how to best engage and communicate with diverse audiences, and how to tackle issues like stage fright.

INCLUDE is about understanding the complex area of diversity, equity and inclusion, looking at how to work with people from all kinds of backgrounds, understanding differences between cultures, and finding ways to help advance social justice through your work.

SHARE is about marketing yourself and your work, including bringing your identity and values to the fore to programmers and the media. Topics include how to present yourself, use different online platforms, and hone your entrepreneurial skills to develop your own funded projects.

SUSTAIN is about both the sustainability of the performing musician, including caring for your body and mind, and being able to sustain a long-term career, as well as looking at how musicians can make a contribution to major global issues such as climate change.

EUYO FRONTRUNNERS 2022 PROGRAMME

The 2022 EUYO Frontrunners programme included 11 online sessions throughout the year. Sessions took place via a dedicated new EUYO digital learning platform *euyodigital.eu*. All sessions are free for the young musicians.

Initially provided for EUYO members and alumni of the past 5 years, from September 2022 sessions were also opened by invitation to selected guests from the EUYO's partner organisations who work with young European musicians and teachers. These include EUYO's National Partners in the 27 EU Member States, the Youth Symphony of Ukraine, the Western Balkans Youth Orchestra, the Lower Austria Music Schools management and the music education network Sistema Europe. •



CAFÉ BAUHAUS

Inspired by European Commission President Ursula Von der Leyen's New European Bauhaus launched in 2020 to help shape more beautiful, sustainable and inclusive forms of European living, EUYO launched Café Bauhaus on Europe Day 2022. An annual open call to EUYO members and recent alumni awards seed funding and free training to projects connecting music to modern day issues such as sustainability, diversity, equity and inclusion. The 2022 Award winning projects were:

TROBAIRITZ: HISTOIRES NATURELLES

Consisting of a series of cross-art chamber music concerts in unusual venues across Paris, performances – mainly by women composers – take the the form of story-telling, including music from different eras combined with poetry and acting. Each concert took place in a different venue representing themes connected with a modern, sustainable life: ecology awareness, cultural diversity, art and humanity. The all-female musician ensemble involved is made up of cross-art creators, embodying the spirit of early Medieval female troubadours, the Trobairitz.

TRÍO BÓREA: **INTERILLES**

Interilles creates an immersive multimedia performance, where chamber music, video projections and mapping, live electronics and field recordings combine, and musicians interact with the audience, who are actively involved in the performance through the use of new technologies. The aim is to bring a new way of enjoying classical music to the Balearic Islands, particularly for tourist and young audiences. Trio Bórea believe that culture and tourism should go hand in hand to create more sustainable and attractive cultural spaces, inspiring new generations to develop their cultural environment.

THIRTEEN NORTH: **HUMAN CONNECTION**

Thirteen North wants to demonstrate how music has the capacity to connect us across ages and celebrate the importance of shared creative experiences. They do so by combining music from Scotland's folk heritage with classical works, while bringing performances to life through a Glasgowbased film artist. The project explores the importance of human connection across all demographics of society, being workshopped with youth participants at a local music hub, performed at contemporary art venues, and shared with the most senior of Scotland's population at local residential homes – all with the aim of drawing an organic line of creative connection across a portion of the Glaswegian population.

CONDUCTORS

2022 saw an array of welcome returns as well as debuts: in order of appearance on the podium, there was the fast-rising star Elim Chan making her first appearance with us, followed by the polymath composer and conductor Iván Fischer, whose activities have often included EUYO members and alumni. During the Summer tour, the EUYO welcomed back a former alumnus, Gustavo Gimeno, as its conductor, as well as Gianandrea Noseda, whose energy in leading the Orchestra has few rivals.

SOLOISTS

German-French cellist Nicolas Altstaedt's versatility and skills opened the first concer of the EUYO Spring Tour in 2022, captivating the audience with his performance of Mieczyslaw Weinberg's Cello concerto, as well as Finnish violinist Kreeta-Julia Heikkilä was able to interpret in the most heartfelt way Sibelius' Violin Concerto in D minor. During the Summer tour, former EUYO alumnus and leading international star Renaud Capuçon shone on stage for his skills as well as for the encore duets with EUYO musicians which garnered roars of applause from the audience. Pianists Jae Hong Park and Francesco Piemontesi both tackled Sergei Rachmaninoff's Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini giving masterful interpretations which were

The year's programme also included a welcome opportunity for the EUYO to worl with ECHO Rising Star Ukrainian violinist and director, Diana Tischenko, as part of the ALPHA MISSION ∆ELOS project. ▶

ELIM CHAN

"I was happy to inspire a lot of women, but I don't want my gender to take away from what I can bring to the music. I want people to see that I am a good conductor"

Elim Chan interviewed by Keith Powers for Classical Voice America

One of the most sought-after artists of her generation, Elim Chan performs an unusually wide-ranging repertory of symphonic works extending from the Classical period to the present day. Chief Conductor of the Antwerp Symphony Orchestra since 2019 and Principal Guest Conductor of the Royal Scottish National Orchestra since 2018, Elim Chan expanded her cooperations in 2022 debuting with Sinfonieorchester Basel, Boston and St. Louis Symphony orchestras, European Union Youth Orchestra, Mahler Chamber Orchestra, ORF Radio-Symphonieorchester Wien, Orchestre National de Lyon and he Junge Deutsche Philharmonie. Further to that, Elim Chan returned to orchestras with whom she is closely connected, including Philharmonia Orchestra, Los Angeles Philharmonic and Gürzenich Orchester Cologne. A native of Hong Kong, Elim Chan studied at Smith College, Northampton, Massachusetts, and at the University of Michigan. In 2014 she was the first female winner of the Donatella Flick Conducting Competition.



IVÁN FISCHER



Conductor, composer, opera director, thinker and educator, anchored in the tradition of the great musical polymaths, Iván Fischer is considered one of the most visionary musicians of our time.

He has developed several new concert formats and reformed the structure and working method of the symphony orchestra. In the mid-1980s he founded the Budapest Festival Orchestra, where he has since introduced and established numerous inprovations.

Iván Fischer has founded a number of festivals, including the Budapest

Mahlerfest, the "Bridging Europe" festival and the Vicenza Opera Festival. The World Economic Forum presented him with the Crystal Award for his achievements in fostering international cultural relations.

He was principal conductor of the National Symphony Orchestra in Washington, the Opéra National de Lyon and the Konzerthausorchester Berlin, the latter appointing him Conductor Laureate. The Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra named him Honorary Guest Conductor following many decades of conductor of the Berlin Philharmonic, the Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestra and New York Philharmonic Orchestra.

Iván Fischer is founder of the Hungarian Mahler Society and patron of the British Kodály Academy. The French government honoured him as Chevalier des Arts et des Lettres. In 2006 he was decorated with the Hungarian Kossuth Prize, in 2011 with the Royal Philharmonic Society Music Award and the Dutch Ovatie Prize, and in 2013 he was named an honorary member of the Royal Academy of Music in London.

"People are good and bad. We are not angels; we are terrible creatures. But we are better thanks to music. For example, if people sit in a concert hall and listen to Mozart, they don't kill each other so easily"

GUSTAVO GIMENO



Born in Valencia, EUYO alumnus Gustavo Gimeno began his international conducting career in 2012 under the mentorship of Mariss Jansons, and benefited from the support and influence of Bernard Haitink and Claudio Abbado. Invited as an opera conductor for major titles at great venues all over the world, and he is much sought-after as a symphonic guest conductor worldwide as well. Since 2015 Gustavo Gimeno he is the Music Director of the Orchestre Philharmonique de Luxembourg, and since the 2020/21 season he occupies the same role in the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. From 2025/26 he will be the Music Director of Teatro Real in Madrid. Following his tenure as Principal Percussionist of the Concertgebouworkest, he maintains a close relationship as conductor. •

GIANANDREA NOSEDA

Gianandrea Noseda is one of the world's most sought-after conductors, equally recognized for his artistry in both the concert hall and opera house. He is Music Director of the National Symphony Orchestra (Washington, D.C.), General Music Director of the Zurich Opera House and Principal Guest Conductor of the London Symphony Orchestra. Noseda has conducted the most important international orchestras including Berlin Philharmonic, Chicago Symphony, Cleveland Orchestra, Concertgebouw Orchestra, Vienna Philharmonic at the most important opera houses such as La Scala, Metropolitan Opera, Royal Opera House and festivals including BBC Proms, Edinburgh, Salzburg, Verbier. Nurturing the next generation of artists is important to Noseda, as evidenced by his constant commitment to tours with the European Union Youth Orchestra, as well as his position as music director of the Tsinandali Festival in Georgia, which

was held for the first time in 2019, with the Pan-Caucasian Youth Orchestra.

DIANATISCHENKO



Crimean-born and Berlin-based violinist Diana Tishchenko started with her aunt Lidia Tishchenko, later studying at the Lysenko Specialised Music School in Kiev. Aged 18 she entered the Gustav Mahler Youth Orchestra, where she became the concertmaster of the orchestra working with Sir Colin Davis, Franz Welser-Möst, Herbert Blomstedt, Antonio Pappano and Daniele Gatti. Upon graduating she performed Prokofiev's Violin Concerto No.2 at the Konzerthaus Berlin conducted by Lahav Shani.

Recent engagements include appearances with Deutsches Symphonie-Orchester Berlin, Shanghai Symphony Orchestra, Munich Chamber Orchestra and Orchestre National d'Ile de France, working with conductors such as Joshua Weilerstein, Andrew Litton and Douglas Boyd Appearances at major festivals include the Verbier Festival and the Salzburg Chamber Music Festival.

During 2022 she took over the artistic direction of the concert series "Resonanzen" in Siegburg, Germany and in the coming season Diana will return some of the most celebrated concert halls in Europe including the Concertgebouw Amsterdam, Philharmonie de Paris and Elbphilharmonie Hamburg.



KREETA-JULIA HEIKKILÄ



Recognized for her energetic, dynamic and sensitive playing, violinist Kreeta-Julia Heikkilä is regularly invited to perform internationally as a soloist, chamber musician and as concertmaster with various orchestras around the world. Passionate about the value of classical music, Kreeta-Julia is dedicated to the organization of new concert concepts emphasizing the connection between the classical music performers and the audience. Heikkilä is also a keen young pedagogue, who works as a violin lecturer and chamber music teacher in Finland and abroad. A prize-winner at numerous national and international violin and chamber music competitions, Kreeta-Julia plays an Andrea Guarneri violin of 1680, kindly on loan from The Finnish Cultural Foundation •

RENAUD CAPUÇON



French violinist and EUYO alumnus
Renaud Capuçon is firmly established
internationally as a major soloist, recitalist
and chamber musician. He is known and
loved for his poise, depth of tone and
virtuosity, and he works with the world's
most prestigious orchestras, artists,
venues and festivals. He has performed
with the EUYO and Yo-Yo Ma under
the Arc de Triomphe for the official
commemoration of Armistice Day in the
presence of more than 80 heads of states
and played for world leaders at the G7
Summit in Biarritz. Capuçon is the Artistic
Director of two festivals, the Sommets
Musicaux de Gstaad, since 2016, and
the Easter Festival in Aix-en-Provence,
which he founded in 2013. From the
2021/22 season, he is also the Artistic
Director of the Orchestre de Chambre de
Lausanne, with which he recorded 'Tabula
Rasa', an album devoted to Arvo Pärt's


JAE HONG PARK

Francesco Piemontesi is a pianist of exceptional refinement of expression, which is allied to a consummate technical skill. The 2021/22 season led him to orchestras such as London Philharmonic, Bergen Philharmonic, Deutsches Symphonie-Orchester Berlin, Budapest Festival Orchestra, Finnish Radio Symphony Orchestra, Gürzenich Orchestra, Philharmonia Zürich, Wiener Symphoniker, Seattle Symphony and Frankfurt Museumsorchester. He also regularly appears with major ensembles worldwide such as London Symphony, Los Angeles Philharmonic, Boston Symphony, NHK Symphony and Cleveland orchestras and many others. Born in Locarno, Francesco Piemontesi studied with Arie Vardi before working with Alfred Brendel, Murray Perahia, Cécile Ousset and Alexis Weissenberg. Since 2012, Piemontesi has been the Artistic Director of the Settimane Musicali di Ascona

PETER STARK REHEARSAL DIRECTOR

Peter Stark has conducted many of the world's leading orchestras, including the London Symphony Orchestra and the Malaysian Philharmonic Orchestra, and has assisted iconic conductors such as Pierre Boulez, Sir Colin Davis, Bernard Haitink and Klaus Tennstedt. Peter is Professor of Conducting at the Royal College of Music, Distinguished Professor of Conducting at the China Conservatory of Music, Beijing and Rehearsal Director of the European Union Youth Orchestra.



LORENZA BORRANI VIOLIN I

Lorenza Borrani's inspiring play/ direct programmes and inclusive approach in music making are recognized and appreciated by the world-renown orchestras. Alongside her orchestral activities, she is a committed chamber music partner in special projects. Leader of The Chamber Orchestra of Europe and founder member of Spira Mirabilis, she is performing as director, soloist and chamber musician all over the world. Lorenza teaches violin and chamber music at the Scuola di Musica di Fiesole and is a Visiting Professor at London's Royal Academy of Music. She is the Artistin-Residence for the The Norwegian Chamber Orchestra in 2020 and for the Orchestra della Toscana in 2022.



OLIVER KIPP VIOLIN I & II

Oliver Kipp studied with Atila Aydintan in Hannover and Thomas Brandis in Berlin. He received his orchestral training as a member of the EUYO from 1987 to 1993, as a trainée of the NDR Radiophilharmonic from 1991 to 1993 and as a substitute of the Berlin Philharmonic from 1994 to 1998. Since 1998 he is a section leader of the NDR Radiophilharmonic. Founder of the Hyperion Trio in 1999, Oliver Kipp also teaches at the Hannover Conservatory of Music and works for the Joseph Joachim Academy at the NDR Radiophilharmonic. Oliver is especially an EUYO alumnus who has served the Orchestra tutor since 2008.



CLARE THOMPSON VIOLIN II

Since leaving the Philharmonia Orchestra, where she was Sub-Leader for over a decade, Clare Thompson is one of London's most sought-after violin teachers. A longstanding professor at Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance, she has also been appointed to the Junior Department of the Royal Academy of Music. A regular tutor for the National Children's Orchestras of Great Britain since 2004, she has also given masterclasses in Georgia, Ukraine and Belarus under the auspices of the prestigious I, Culture Orchestra, with whom she has been a tutor since 2012. She also continues to work in the studio recording film scores, including The Hunger Games, Harry Potter and The Hobbit.



DANUSHA WASKIEWICZ VIOLA

Danusha started her solo career as the first viola of the Orchestra Mozart of Bologna, which she joined following Claudio Abbado's invitation. For several years she was part of the Luzern Festival Orchestra and she has performed with prestigious orchestras, such as the Bayerisch Rundfunk Orchestra. At 25 she became a member of the Berlin Philharmoniker. After two years, she won the qualifying competition for the leadership of the viola section. Member of the famous Italian quartet Quartetto Prometeo since 2018, Danusha has earned recognition as an excellent chamber musician.



PASCAL SIFFERT VIOLA

Pascal was a member of the Salzburg Camerata between 1992 and 1997, and during that time also performed regularly with the Ensemble Modern in Frankfurt. He played with the Ensemble Pyramide in Zürich between 1989 and 1995 and continues to perform chamber music with various ensembles. He joined the Chamber Orchestra of Europe as a member in 1990 and was invited to become Principal Viola in 2001. In 1996 he moved to Stockholm and has been principal viola of the Royal Stockholm Philharmonic Orchestra since 2002.



STEFANO GUARINO CELLO

A skilled cellist as well as pianist, Stefano Guarino is an EUYO alumnus. He has performed as cellist for many orchestras such as the Orchestra del Teatro Regio di Torino, the Orchestra Sinfonica Toscanini and the Lucerne Festival Orchestra under Claudio Abbado, and is currently is Principal Cellist of the Camerata Salzburg since 2010. Stefano teaches cello in the Conservatory of Trento since 2007 and has worked as tutor for several orchestras and ensembles such as the Britten Pears Youth Orchestra.



GREGOR HORSCH CELLO

Born in Germany, Gregor Horsch studied at the Freiburg University of Music with Christoph Henkel and later at the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester with Ralph Kirshbaum. After graduating with honours in 1989, Horsch moved to the Netherlands, serving successively as principal cellist with the Netherlands Balletorkest and the Residentie Orchestra. He was appointed principal cellist of the Concertgebouw Orchestra in 1997, a position that he has since held. Gregor is professor of Cello in the Robert Schumann Hochschule in Düsseldorf since 2009, and EUYO cello tutor since 2015.



ALEXANDRA SCOTT DOUBLE BASS

Professor for Double Bass at the Hochschule für Musik und Theatre, München since October 2020, Alexandra Scott previously held the same teaching position since 2012 in Karlsruhe. During this time, between 2007 and 2020 Alexandra was sub-principal double bass with the Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestra. After being a member of the Karajan Akademie, she was appointed Principal Bass of the NDR Radio Philharmonic. A dedicated chamber musician, she regularly coaches the EUYO, of which she is an alumna, as well as other orchestras.



WIES DE BOEVÉ DOUBLE BASS

Wies de Boevé is co-principal bassist with the Symphonieorchester des Bayerischen Rundfunks and Professor at the Zurich University of Arts. After playing with the EUYO in 2007-2008, he joined the Karajan Academy and became the first-prize winner of the ARD competition in Munich, the Deutscher Musikwettbewerb and the Bottesini competition in Crema. He performs with many of the finest orchestras in the world and is an EUYO tutor since 2014.



PHILIPPA DAVIES WOODWIND

Originally Principal Flute of the National Youth Orchestra of GB, Philippa went on to train at the Royal College of Music with Douglas Whittaker and later William Bennett. Former member of of the ensembles Capricorn, Albion and Sir Peter Maxwell Davies's Fires of London, she is currently a member of the Nash Ensemble and London Winds and continues to be a regular guest principal flute with all the main London orchestras. She gives masterclasses, recitals and broadcasts, and performs concertos throughout the world.



RICCARDO TERZO WOODWIND

Born in Palermo, Italy, Riccardo Terzo began playing as a solo bassoonist with the Mozarteum Orchestra in Salzburg in 2010 after completing his studies, having already won three international bassoon competitions. After his graduation at the University of Salzburg Mozarteum in 2012, he also lectured as a professor at the University of Linz in the 2014/2015 summer semester. Since 2017, Riccardo Terzo has been working as a bassoon artist for the renowned Fox Productions American bassoon company.



MALTE REFARDT WOODWIND

Malte Refardt has been principal bassoon with the Bayerisches Staatsorchester and the NDR Radiophilharmonie and currently teaches at the Folkwang University of the Arts in Essen. An extremely experienced chamber musician, he performs regularly with orchestras around the world, including with his – and our – friend Kai Frömbgen. He gives masterclasses in Europe, America and Asia and is a jury member of the Kyoto Prize, the Japanese equivalent to the Nobel Prize.



DANIEL PERPIÑÁN **LOWER BRASS**

Daniel Perpiñán took part in the Leverhulme Summer School organized by the EUYO when he was 16. He later ioined the Orchestra and then went on to study under Peter Gane at the Guildhall School in London. Daniel is former principal trombone of the Bilbao Symphony Orchestra. Currently he is trombone professor at the Escola Superior de Música de Catatunya and Conservotori del Liceu in Barcelona, Conservatorio Superior de Música de Aragón in Zaragoza and Brass Academy in Alicante.



PETER GANE LOWER **BRASS**

Peter Gane is the longest serving tutor of the EUYO, back to when it was the European Community Youth Orchestra. Former assistant principal trombone of the LSO and the Founder and first President of the British Trombone Society 1984. Head of wind, brass and percussion at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama 1988-2008, professor of trombone and member of the brass faculty at the Guildhall School since 1971, where in 2022 Peter was appointed Senior Professor to the department of Wind, Brass and Percussion and regularly contributes to the specialist brass and wind programmes. Trombone tutor to the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain, Peter is a composer, educationalist, conductor and Artistic Adviser to the Combret Music Festival in Aveyron, France.



FRØYDIS REE WEKRE HORN

Norwegian horn soloist and teacher Frøydis Ree Wekre studied piano and violin before turning to horn at the age of 17. Outside of Norway, her studies have taken place in Sweden, Russia and USA. After one year in the Norwegian Opera, she joined the Oslo Philharmonic orchestra as co-principal, a position she left in 1991. She has also been very active as a soloist and chamber musician, mostly in Europe and North America. As a teacher, Frøydis was Professor of Horn and Chamber Music at the Norwegian Academy of Music until 2011. Her book, "Thoughts on Playing the Horn well" has been translated into several languages. More than 40 compositions are written for her.



WIM VAN HASSELT TRUMPET

Wim Van Hasselt worked with the Radio Symphony Orchestra Berlin and had orchestral internships at the Deutsche Oper Berlin and the State Opera Stuttgart before spending many years in the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra Amsterdam. As a guest he performed with the Berlin Philharmonic, the Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestra and the Lucerne Festival Orchestra. Most recently, he was awarded the prestigious Edison Classic Award 2021 for Imaginary Mirror, the debut album of his duo ART'uur. Professor of trumpet at the University of Music Freiburg and at the Norwegian Academy of Music Oslo, he enthusiastically transmits his passion for music to the next generation as an EUYO tutor.



ANNE **MCANENEY TRUMPET**

Belfast-born Anne McAneney studied trumpet at Goldsmiths College and as a post-graduate at the Guildhall School of Music & Drama. Appointed Principal Trumpet in the Royal Ballet Orchestra in 1985, she was the first woman to hold a Principal Trumpet position in the UK. She started a freelance career in 1989 and was soon working regularly with all the major London symphony orchestras and chamber music groups. In 1995, she became a Professor of Trumpet at the Guildhall School of Music & Drama. Since 2000 she has been Sub-Principal Trumpet with the London Philharmonic Orchestra, of which she was a member of the orchestra Board for 6 years.



SAM WALTON PERCUSSION

Sam Walton appears regularly as a percussionist and timpanist with many of the UK's top orchestras and the Chamber Orchestra of Europe. He appeared at numerous venues worldwide both as a solo recitalist and with his duo partner Colin Currie. He performs regularly with violist Viktoria Mullova and appears on her recital disc Through the Looking Glass. A member of the contemporary group Between The Notes, Sam has also appeared as a soloist at the BBC Proms in a programme of music by Steve Reich.



JOSEF GUMPINGER PERCUSSION

Josef Gumpinger graduated with distinctions at the Anton Bruckner Private University in Linz, where he held two percussion classes from 1999 to 2011. Since 2011 he has held the classical percussion chair at the University of Music and Performing Arts Vienna. In 1993 he joined the ORF Vienna Radio Symphony Orchestra as percussionist, becoming its timpani leader in 2009. With Prof. Gerhard Windbacher he founded the percussion ensemble Supercussion Vienna which premiered many works by leading composers.



FABRICE PIERRE HARP

Harpist and conductor Fabrice Pierre studied harp with Pierre Jamet and conducting with Paul Ethuin and Franco Ferrara at the Paris Conservatory. In 1980 he was appointed assistant conductor of the Inter-Contemporary Ensemble of Pierre Boulez and Peter Eotvos and in 1984, was appointed harp professor at the CNSMD in Lyon, where since 1997 he has also been musical director of the "Atelier du XXe siècle". Fabrice Pierre has a dual career as conductor and harpist, devoting a major part of his activities to chamber music. He is regularly invited to major international festivals.

The European Union Youth Orchestra is one of the world's pre-eminent symphony orchestras. Described by the UK Guardian as having "gripping, exhilaratingly good orchestral playing, surging with energy, lasersharp focus and collective daring... [with] a technical prowess that is downright terrifying", and by former EU commission President Jean-Claude Juncker as "the best possible ambassador for the European Union" it has provided an exceptional bridge between music colleges and the professional music world for generations of Europe's finest musicians since its foundation in 1976.

The Orchestra has worked with many of the world's greatest musicians including Daniel Barenboim, Leonard Bernstein, Herbert von Karajan, Mstislav Rostropovich and particularly its three Music Directors and current Chief Conductor: Founding Music Director Claudio Abbado, former Music Director Vladimir Ashkenazy, former Music Director and Conductor Laureate Bernard Haitink, and Chief Conductor Vasily Petrenko.

The EUYO's almost 4000 alumni have all come through the Orchestra's rigorous, annual audition process conducted in all EU Member States, and many are now notable conductors, soloists, teachers and instrumentalists working with the major orchestras of Europe and throughout the world.

A truly global brand, the EUYO has performed in most of the world's major concert halls and festivals, including the BBC Proms at London's Royal Albert Hall, New York's Carnegie Hall and Vienna's Musikverein. From Amsterdam to Abu Dhabi, Moscow to Mumbai, Seoul to São Paulo, the Orchestra has appeared in many hundreds of venues across five continents. Recent awards include the award for the best-televised concert at the 59th Golden Prague International Festival for ALPHA MISSION ∆ELOS, the European Cultural Brand of the Year 2020, the European Orchestra Award TAURUS and an Abu Dhabi Culture Summit Cultural Diplomat of the Year Award 2018. ▶

During 2022 the Orchestra launched a new online learning programme, *EUYO Frontrunners*, and the *Peace in Europe* project, a series of concerts in countries across Europe from the Baltic to the Mediterranean and the East of Europe to the North Sea, all dedicated to the

cause of peace in Europe and to highlighting the plight of victims of violence. On Europe Day 2022 the EUYO also launched *Café Bauhaus*, an innovative environmentally friendly small scale music series, and on May 30 was the first orchestra ever to perform on the sacred Greek island of Delos in a World Human Forum concert livestreamed on Arte TV and broadcast on big screens across Europe to raise awareness globally about the urgent need for the regeneration of our planet.

2022 also included major orchestral residencies in Grafenegg (Austria), Ferrara and Bolzano (Italy), Helsinki and Tampere (Finland), with events in cities including Amsterdam, Berlin, Bologna, Bolzano, Brussels, Cremona, Delos, Ferrara, Grafenegg, Helsinki, Lusławice, Prague, Tampere, Udine and Warsaw. Many of these events highlighted the European Year of Youth 2022.

The Orchestra's home between 2018 and 2022 has

been in Italy thanks to support from the Italian Ministry of Culture, Ferrara Musica and the Italian broadcaster RAI. As from 2023 the EUYO is establishing its headquarters in Austria thanks to support from Grafenegg, Lower Austria and the Federal Republic of Austria, where it

recently launched its new Music Hub Austria programme. The Orchestra is resident Orchestra at Grafenegg, and partner of Campus Grafenegg, and also Ensemble in Residence at the Stauffer Center for Strings in Cremona, Italy.

The EUYO is supported by the Creative Europe programme of the European Commission, and by the 27 Member States of the European Union.

Founded by Joy and Lionel Bryer in 1976, the EUYO has been a Cultural Ambassador for the European Union for more than forty years. The EUYO's Honorary President is the President of the European Parliament, currently

Roberta Metsola, and its Honorary Patrons include Ursula von der Leyen, President of the EU Commission and Charles Michel, President of the European Council, and the Heads of State and Government, the ministers of foreign affairs and culture of the EU Member States.
